What are we learning about?

English	Maths
In English, we will be reading the story Way Home for Wolf written by Rachel Bright. We will use the story as inspiration for a variety of writing opportunities, including a narrative piece and a nonfiction information page about an animal. We will focus on a range of grammar skills, including capital letters, full stops and using joining words in our writing.	- Place value and the number system - Measurement, length and mass - Addition and subtraction within 100 - 2D and 3D shapes

Unit: Living things and their habitats Big Question: What would live in a habitat like this? Vocabulary: Living, dead, never been alive, suited, suitable, basic needs, food, food chain, shelter, move, feed Names of local habitats e.g. pond, woodland Names of micro-habitats e.g. under logs, in bushes	Unit: Rosa Parks Big Question: How did Rosa Park's courageous stand spark a movement that changed history? Vocabulary: primary and secondary source, timeline, chronology, significant, civil rights, boycott, discrimination, segregation, protest, Montgomery, America

Computing	Design Technology
Unit: Computer Systems and networks Big Question: If you could rename information technology what would you name it? Vocabulary: information technology, computer, barcode, scanner/scan	Unit: Food – Cut, slice and peel to create a tasty dip. Big Question: What ingredients will make a tasty and healthy salad dip. Vocabulary: fruit and vegetables, utensils, soft, juicy, crunchy, sweet, sticky, smooth, sharp, crisp, sour, hard, flesh, skin, seed, pip, core, slicing, peeling, cutting, squeezing, popular, design, evaluate, criteria
Music	Physical Education
Unit: African – Hands, Feet, Heart Big Question: Are African style songs only popular in Africa? Vocabulary: Pulse (beat), Rhythm (long and short), Tempo (fast and slow), Dynamics (loud and quiet), texture, tune, improvisation, composition, notation, synthesizer, glockenspiel, beater, vibrations, notes, lyrics, lead and second vocal, song structure, introduction, verse, chorus, instrumental, South African music, gospel, rest, forte, piano	Unit: FMS unit (Underarm Throw) Big Question: What does a good underarm throw look like? Vocabulary: throw, underarm, overarm, swing, accurate Unit: Piggy in the Middle Big Question: How can we use simple tactics in a 3V1 game? Our PE days are Monday and Wednesday Please make sure your child has a full PE kit in school on these days.
PSHE	Religious Education
Unit: Relationships Big Question: What is bullying? Vocabulary: Permission, physical contact, bullying, deliberate, unacceptable	Unit: Christianity - God Big Question: Does how we treat the world matter? Vocabulary: harvest, creation story, sustain

Homework will alternative between English and Maths weekly. It will be given out every Friday and needs to be returned the following Wednesday. The children are also expected to read at least three times a week at home.
